There needs to be a clearer understanding of the individuals who conducted Evangelical services in Glen Rock. All the names on the list of Pastors who served (page 103) from 1842 - 1847 should just be considered individuals who provided some form of Evangelical preaching in town starting in William Heathcote's School House located at 102 - 104 Church Street.

The individual listed in the Central Pennsylvania Conference history for 1848, is Uriah Eberhart - belonging to Shrewsbury and from 1849 - 1866 the individuals are listed as belonging to the Shrewsbury Circuit.

Jacob Hartzler (1833-1916) was the first RESIDENT Immanuel pastor. The Conference history lists him as being assigned to Glen Rock and not the Shrewsbury Circuit, in March 1867.

Page 110 - [left column - text incorrect for picture and picture should now be on page 101] The building in the picture is 108 - 112 Church Street which was built in 1849 and was the first brick church on Church Street, NOT the school built by William Heathcote. The first school building was built in the 1840's and was located at what is now [June, 2010] 102 - 104 Church Street.

Page 124 - [left column - under picture] - Replace second sentence with - **The operator had the responsibility for control of the semaphore signals and the crossing gates.**

Page 269 - [caption under picture should read] Amos Bubb in doorway of his jewelry store located on Water Street next to railroad tracks. Note Enterprise Building back left still does not have the windows installed.

Page 271 - [right column - second paragraph] The tailoring business started in 1881 was continued by Israel Glatfelter until 1903. He was succeeded in turn by his son Robert (1864-1935), and his grandson, Harry R. Gladfelter (1896-1958)(note the change in spelling of last name). In 1936 Harry “Roxy” Gladfelter bought an empty building lot at 11 Main Street from Oliver Cramer for \$500.00.
